# **Reminders**



One of the simplest things you can do to keep your neighborhood safe is to be an aware neighbor. The Oklahoma City Police Department suggests the first step to becoming an "aware neighbor" is to know your neighbors on a more personal level. Knowing what kind of car they drive or what visitors most usually look like may seem a bit intrusive, but it could help to prevent burglaries and other types of crimes from occurring in our community. Attached to this newsletter is the "9 House Model". It is a self-explanatory directory tool to help you keep track of your neighbors information in case of suspicious activity or an emergency. Also, if you or any of your neighbors witness suspicious activity (unfamiliar persons/cars in the area, cars driving especially slowly through the street, any type of loitering, etc.) please remember to call 911 and report what you see. If the situation is not an emergency, simply tell the operator it is a "non-emergency" call. Help us keep our neighborhood safe!

## **Broken Window Theory**

In the mid 1970's two criminologists from New Jersey, James Q. Wilson and George L. Kelling, produced the Broken Window Theory. In the simplest terms, the theory suggests that something as minor as a broken window in a building can effect the numbers on crime in a community, and can effect the attitudes of citizens toward crime and criminal behavior. While many cities have tried to apply the "broken window" approach to their efforts on crime, none succeeded more than New York in the 1990's under Mayor Rudy Giuliani. Giuliani increased the number of New York police officers by 35%, increased the number of officers patrolling on foot as opposed to patrolling in vehicles, made graffiti clean up a top priority, and, yes, literally fixed broken windows throughout the more urban areas of New York. These efforts resulted in a 56% decrease in violent crime, as well as a 65% decrease in property crime. Although there has been some criticism of the actual effectiveness of this theory, no one can argue with the numbers. As citizens, we can learn from the broken window theory and apply it to small nuances in our daily lives. The broken down refrigerator on your front porch, the excessive peeling paint on the exterior of your house, or, yes, the broken window that can be seen from the street, are not only eye sores for your neighbors, but may be promoting criminal activity in our community. This spring we will be devoting time and effort into fixing our broken windows, please join us and help keep our community safe.
